PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

Can you believe it, on September 25th and 26th, 2026, we are celebrating 150 years of tradition!!

Our theme this year, “Country Roads, Take Me Home” fits the occasion perfectly as it implies the journey home for many of our past patrons and residents. Glencoe Fair weekend to me, and to so many others, has always been like a reunion. Once a year, you knew you would see all your old friends and/ or family at some point throughout the weekend at the Fair. That atmosphere still exists today and hopefully it will endure another 150 years!

Before 1876, the local townships had their own fairs so the Mosa Agricultural Association and the Ekfrid Agricultural Society each had their own fairs separately. Mosa and Ekfrid eventually merged into a Union and co-hosted one fair. In 1876, that Union was incorporated under the Glencoe Agricultural Society which is still in existence 150 years later.

We always mention the tradition of the Glencoe Fair but in reality, our fair is more than just a tradition. The common goal of the Agricultural Societies in Canada is to educate and promote the business of agriculture to the general public. Yes, tradition is a huge part of that as we look back at all the long hours and hard, sometimes tedious work, that went into the farming lifestyle throughout the years. But the origins of the fairs weren't just about preserving the traditions and the lifestyle of agriculture it was about competition. The competition to see who had the best corn crop or the best elderberry pie. But that competition led to sharing information, letting your neighbours know what you did different to get the edge on the competition. This evolved the business agricultural in Canada and in turn created a sense of community and pride within the different towns, townships and regions.

What we are ultimately celebrating for the Glencoe Agricultural Society's 150th Glencoe Fair is more than just tradition. We are celebrating 150 years of bringing a community together. The Glencoe Agricultural Society honoured me, by electing me to the position president for the 150th anniversary of this amazing organization but I am humbled by the company I keep as a president. The past actions and achievements of the presidents before me are immeasurable. The work and knowledge that they put into building the buildings and the grounds and the society that we represent today are what makes us what we are and it is the reason we are still here 150 plus years later. Many of our past presidents and members were pillars of our community and leaders in innovation.

Many of our members today are not in the business of agriculture and many don't have ties to farming at all. But we market agriculture because of how important it is to our community, to our province and to Canada. We believe in educating and promoting the business of agriculture from its past roots through its entire evolution to today. We support the traditions of agriculture while promoting the achievements of today. But more importantly, we support the communities inherent in the Agricultural Societies

from the dawn of the annual fairs in Canada to today. We support you and we support our community. We show support by funding and donating to different service and support groups in the community and by sponsoring public initiatives and events. We also show it through our dedication and devotion hosting large annual events like our truck and tractor pull and the Glencoe Fall Fair. The hours and labour are long and tedious but feeling of accomplishment of running a successful event, hearing the positive reviews and seeing people and families thoroughly enjoy themselves gives us a feeling of accomplishment and pride that makes everything worthwhile.

The reality of still being an active, viable Agricultural Society and celebrating 150 years of excellence, is that it takes a community to endure. Without our volunteers, both past and present, and without our sponsors and donors, we would not still be in existence today. Our volunteers give up countless hours of their time and resources and put the Ag Society and our events ahead of themselves and, in many cases, their families. Our sponsors and donors are dedicated and loyal to a fault in supporting us and our events and we would be nowhere without them. But our biggest supporters are you, our patrons. Without your support, we wouldn't still be here 150 years later.

Just for you, we have a fun-filled evening on Friday night with our famous demolition derby hosted by I Am Demolition; our fabulous midway by Cope Amusements; our kids zone hosted by Bethel Baptist; Fiddling Duo Greyhound Rider Entertainment Tent and live entertainment from Screeched Inn in our beverage tent. We have vendors galore both under the big tops and throughout the grounds. Saturday we have the historic Glencoe Fair Parade; 4-H livestock shows all day; our amazing midway by Cope Amusements; live busker entertainment all around grounds all day long; live entertainment featuring Silver Soul, Rod & Reba and the Pierce Family Band; meet Chase from Paws Patrol, see Magic Mel, get your faces painted & try some line dancing at the free Kids Activity Zone in the Curling Arena. And of course, finish the evening off and wrap up the celebrations with fireworks and an outdoor fair dance, kicking off around 8:00 p.m.

The Glencoe Fair Ambassador Program provides an opportunity for young adults between the ages of 18-24 to get involved in their community while also gaining valuable skills! Our goal is for participants to come out of this experience feeling more confident in public speaking, networking, introducing themselves, interviewing, and conducting themselves professionally.

The ambassador will spend their year attending events within the Glencoe community such as the fair, and within the greater community of agricultural societies at the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Convention (Feb. 18-20, 2027) and at the Canadian National Exhibition (CNE) Ambassador of the Fairs Competition. Attending these events allows the ambassador the time and space to improve upon a variety of professional and personal skills in several environments, as well as the incredible experience of meeting fellow fair ambassadors and agricultural society members from across Ontario.

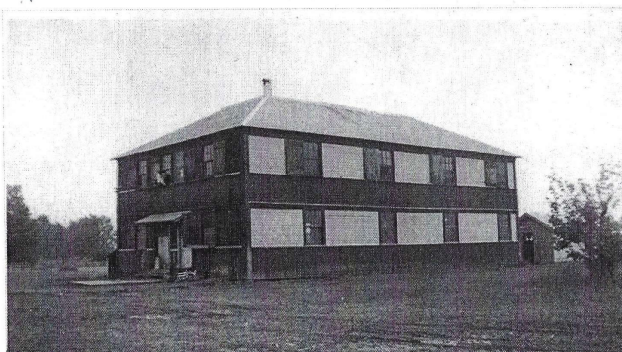

2026 GLENCOE FAIR RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Glencoe Agricultural Society will not be deducting entry fees from prize money won by exhibitors, but the prize money will remain the same. The only deduction will be membership of \$7.00 (where applicable) for next year, thus resulting in a larger net cheque for the exhibitors, our way of saying thank you.

1. Seven dollars paid will constitute membership for one year and entitles the member to one admission ticket.
2. **All** homecraft and baking displays will remain in the Agricultural Hall until **Saturday September 26th, 2026, at 4pm**. Exhibitors can pick up their items on Saturday September 26th, 2026, at **4:15pm**.
3. No exhibitor shall receive more than one Society prize on produce or manufactured articles of any kind.
4. All produce articles must be grown by the exhibitor of this year's growth. Beans may be the growth of 2026.
5. All manufactured articles must be shown in the name of the manufacturer.
6. Not more than one entry may be made by an exhibitor in each section of the following classes: Grain, Roots and Vegetables, Fruit, Dairy Products, Home Department, Ladies Work, Junior Section and Livestock unless otherwise specified.
7. All special prizes will be awarded to the article winning the Society's first prize, except for special prizes offered for prizes and for articles for which the Society does not offer a prize and such articles shall be judges for special prizes only.
8. No animals shall compete for more than one Society prize unless specified.
9. All livestock must be on the grounds by 11:00am Saturday and not be removed before 4:00pm without permission.
10. Every facility will be given to facilities desiring to sell stock or articles on exhibition.
11. Exhibitors, upon arriving with their exhibits, will apply to the Secretary who will be stationed within the office to inform them where the articles are to be placed.
12. All exhibitors must obtain an exhibitor's number from the Secretary and have a paid membership to exhibit articles.

13. **ADMISSIONS TO GROUNDS:** Daily admission of \$15 (Friday) and \$10 (Saturday) for adults and high school aged, \$5 for primary school children and FREE for children under 4 years old.
14. All entries will be made with the Secretary in writing before the first day of the show. Prizes will be paid as soon as possible after the Fair.
15. Seven dollars will be retained from each prize cheque sent over \$10 for 2026 membership. Prize under \$10 will be dispersed as cash and not a cheque.
16. Any persons who shall interfere with the Judges while in the discharge of their duties, or who shall afterwards, on the premises of the Society, use any contemptuous or abusive language to any Judge in consequence of any award made by him or any person wilfully violating any of the rules of this Society, shall forfeit his right to any premiums to which he might otherwise be entitled. Judges are requested to report such to the Secretary.
17. All protests against the award of Judges must be made in writing with a fee of \$25.00 which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained; and all such protests and applications for corrections or errors in regard to prizes awarded must be made within one week or they cannot be entertained. Any animal or article being protested and found ineligible, the next in order will take a higher place.
18. All exhibits for special prizes will be judged by the Judges appointed by the Society and all awards made by the Judges shall be final.
19. All entries must be properly filled in for the Secretary whether special or otherwise, on entry forms provided. This rule is strictly adhered to.
20. Any members exchanging stock, grain or any articles for the purpose of exhibiting, without actual ownership shall not only be censured but shall have all prizes in every department cancelled.
21. The Board will take every precaution to prevent accidents but will not hold themselves responsible for any accidents that may occur on the grounds during the Fair.
22. **ANY MEMBER WHO NEGLECTS TO CASH THEIR CHEQUES BEFORE THE 31ST DAY OF DECEMBER AFTER THE SHOW. WILL FORFEIT THE SAME TO THE SOCIETY.**

23. All parties taking special prizes must receive a certificate from the Secretary before collecting the same and shall forfeit all rights to the prize if not collected on or before December 14th, 2026.
24. The Board of Directors reserve the right to pay prize money at a rate on the dollar of the financial resources do not suffice to pay in full. In the event of the cancellation of any or all of the events at the Fair, due to weather or other reasons, the Board of Directors reserves the right to eliminate payment of any or all of the prize money.
25. No article may be shown for a Special unless in Open Class.
- HORSES: All horses being exhibited at the Fair are to be negative to an immunodiffusion test (Coggins test) or Equine Infectious Anemia within one year of the date of the Fair. A certificate is to be made available to Fair Board Officials.
 - CATTLE: All cattle being exhibited at the Fair must have an official CCIA ear-tag. All cattle must be tied in the designated area in order to exhibit.
 - SHEEP: All sheep being exhibited at the Fair must be accompanied by a certificate of health of flock of origin used by practicing Veterinarian or a Health of Animals Veterinarian within 60 days of the date of the Fair.
 - SWINE: All swine being exhibited at the Fair must be accompanied by a certificate of health of heard of origin issued by a practicing Veterinarian or a Health of Animals Veterinarian or a Veterinarian of the Veterinary Services Branch, Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food issued within 60 days of the date of the Fair.

TO ALL EXHIBITORS AND FAIR GOERS

The Board of Directors would like to take this opportunity to say “Thank You” to all exhibitors both past and present. All persons entering the grounds must pay the admission fee. NO EXCEPTIONS; everyone will be treated alike. This applies to officials of the Fair, employees, exhibitors, performers, concessionaires and fair visitors. Many years’ experience at Fairs in the United States and Canada, with the “Everybody Pays” policy has proved to be reasonable and fair and it has met with co-operative approval of the fair going public. Members will be admitted with membership passes. If you have not paid your membership or exhibited, then you will not receive a membership pass.

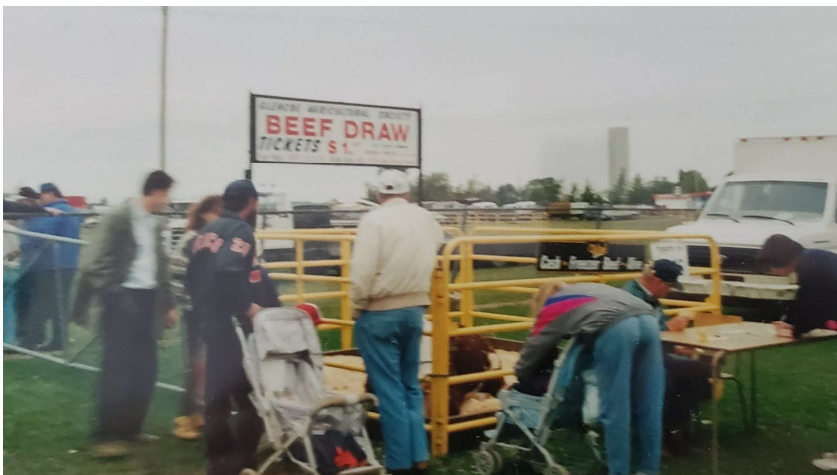

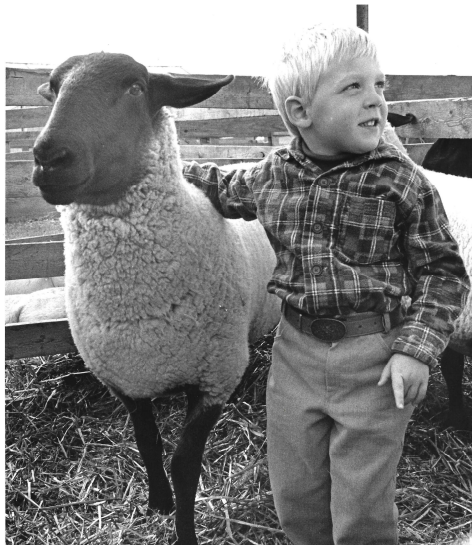

3. ALL ENTRIES ARE TO REMAIN IN THE ARENA UNTIL Saturday, SEPTEMBER 26th, 2026! Exhibits can be picked up between 3:30-5:00PM. ITEMS NOT PICKED UP WILL BE DISPOSED OF by the Glencoe Agricultural Society.
4. Junior Fair exhibitors are boys and girls 14 years of age and UNDER on the first day of the fair September 25th, 2026.
5. You should supply your own containers for fruit, vegetables and flowers. We are not responsible for the return of such containers.
6. Only one entry per child per section. Child may enter in their age category ONLY! No items are allowed to be double tagged.
7. All items should be home grown or baked – no mixes, baking kits or craft kits allowed unless specifically noted.
8. Be aware of the number of units and size requirements.
9. All entries must be a new entry not entered in previous years.
10. Decision of the judges shall be final and no complaints regarding their decisions will be considered! All work must be exhibitor's own.

11. If entrant is school age, please specify school attended and the exhibitor's address and phone number as prize money will be distributed at the schools. If entrant is under school age, please fill in address and phone number on tag.
